Best Practices regarding student Welfare

A- Certificate Course -Self Defense

Vision - Nirbhaya

The Goals of the Course

- a) To train students to be on their guard in times of emergency,
- b) To prepare students for unarmed combat techniques
- c) To improve the overall physical condition and mental approach of students to health, fitness and safety

The context

Self-defence, especially for women, is of utmost importance in the kind of the world we live in today. In a country like India where cases of gender violence are on the rise, out of which many go unreported, self-defence for women has become a necessity more than ever. These facts have been reinforced with cases such as Nirbhaya Rape case. This case was an eye opener to many educational institutes all over India on the importance of having self-defense course of the students especially of girl students, our institute was no different. After the horrific tragedy the President of our institute Jan Seva Samiti Dr. M.I. Patel was of the view that girls should be trained to defend themselves in case of any untoward incident. With this vision provided by the President, the College authorities undertook a brainstorming exercise on how to implement the vision of the President. The output of the exercise was that the authorities decided to conduct a 6 months certificate course on Self-defense for the first year students free of cost.

The Practice

The course was jointly implemented by the department of NCC and the Enrichment Department of the college. The course was conducted for a period of 6 months which included 180 of hours of practical training and contact lectures. 700 First year students were enrolled for the course. Practical training was provided for 120 hours where students were trained in various unarmed combat techniques, to use easily available items in times of need, to defend oneself when attacked. Awareness was created To improve the overall physical condition and mental approach of students to health, fitness and safety. The instructor for the programme was Lt. Nazia Syed

Evidence of Success

The learning from the course

The students were trained

- in various unarmed combat techniques such as moves, kicks, punches, twists and turns,
- To use easily available items such as pen, deo, ,college bags, dupatta ,key as weapons in times of need
- 3. to defend oneself when attacked by knife pistol or pointed objects
- 4. to free oneself from a mob attack

b) Awareness created

- 1. To remain fit enough to run fast.
- 2. To be vigilant when walking on the road to avoid groping or chain-snatching from behind.
- 3. To Keep their purse ahead of them and walk paying full attention around.
- 4. To avoid high-heeled footwear when you have to walk a long distance and in unknown territories.
- 5. To say 'STOP' in a loud and aggressive voice when needed without using swear words or threats.
- 6. To pretend to be submissive at first and fight back when the attacker is off-guard.

Problems Encountered and resources Required

- Lack of motivation among the Students to enroll for the course
- Absenteeism among the students
- Apprehension of the parents that the course can increase the level of aggression among the girl students



B - AARAMBH

Goals-

- 1. To improve hemoglobin level of students belonging to the lower income group
- 2. Controlling the students dropout as result of poor health
- 3. Providing the needy students with the required College Stationery

The Context

The Health Department of the College with the objective of creating awareness on health issues among the students and the staff regularly conducts health related various activities. For instance inviting Doctors to enlighten students and faculty on various health issues. Other activity which they conduct annually is screening of blood of the first year degree students. This activity is created with the objective to detect students suffering from thalassemia and also to track students who are suffering from low hemoglobin level. After the screening the blood the students who suffer from thalassemia and om low hemoglobin level are referred to doctors. In the current academic 650 students blood were screened and out of which it was revealed suffer from thalassemia and 85 students suffer from low hemoglobin level. Deficiency in iron has caused severe health problems such as

- 1. poor concentration in studies
- 2. low level of stamina
- 3. Low BP
- 4. low immunity level

The health committee of the College undertook a detailed study on the 85 students and it was revealed that many of the students suffer from low hemoglobin level as they are unable to consume nutritious food due to their poor economic condition. The side effect of these poor health they are not able to continue their studies and due to which they are forced to discontinue their studies. These facts were reported to the community welfare team of the college. Understanding the reason The Community welfare team of the College decided to track the exact number of students who are financially hindered to have nutritious food and which is leading to poor hemoglobin level. These It was observed that there are 35 needy students. After brainstorming on the problem the committee proposed to provide nutritious food to the needy students.

The Practice

The proposal was placed in front of the Management for its approval. The management decided the take up the requirement of the needy students in two stages. In the first stage they would be provided with the nutritious food and in the second stage they would be provided with books and other stationery required in the college.



To implement the first stage the steps required -- Agency to implement the scheme b) Funding of the scheme c) How to implement the scheme.

Agency to implement the scheme- It was decided that the college canteen would be implementing the scheme. Canteen in consultation with the health committee drafted a nutritious menu for the students. It was decided everyday one sumptuous meal would be provided to the students and the menu charted was as follows

- Monday- Khichdi
- Tuesday-Dhokla
- · Wednesday Idli
- · Thursday- Poha
- · Friday- Chana
- Saturday- missal pav

<u>Funding of the scheme</u>- It was decided that in the academic year for 200 days, students would be provided nutritious food and cost of the meal per plate was worked at 20 Rs. The total expense of the project was estimated to be 140,000 Rs. For raising the funds, it was decided to approach donors within the institute. In the academic year, a total of Rs 28000/- was collected from various donors.

<u>How to implement the scheme-</u>To maintain the dignity of the students, it was also decided that the needy students should not be provided food separately and hence they would be provided with coupons which they could exchange at the canteen counter.

Evidence of Success

The project has seen an improvement in the overall attendance of the students who were covered by the project. Also there is a marked progression in the attention span of the students. Similarly the incidents of students falling sick and requiring medical aid has dropped.

Problems Encountered and resources required

- Students consider it below their self Esteem to accept food from the college
- As the project depends upon the Donation received from the staff sustainability is a serious concern
- Ignorance among the students regarding the project
